

















THE ROUGH WITH THE SMOOTH

A contemporary extension has allowed the ground floor to be opened up into a spacious L-shaped kitchen and dining room (above and opposite). The chunky, square-cut floor units are made from cast concrete, with a series of open slots and shelves into which drawers and appliances can be fitted as necessary.

For extra interest, pea shingle was incorporated into the surface, which catches the light to beautiful effect. Bright ceramics and old jelly moulds soften the look








SHADES OF GREY

Elegant pieces of furniture, such as a traditional Swedish settle, are offset by industrial-style metal accessories and the cool subdued colour scheme of pale greys, soft blues and off-whites, which introduces an element of beach-house style (opposite).
