













Standing outside interiors stylist Julie Hailey and developer David Ray's home you would be forgiven for thinking you were deep in the heart of the countryside. With its white picket fence and painted weatherboarding, the cottage is tucked away down a small private road and overlooking a duck

pond. In fact, Julie and David are only 10 minutes' drive from centre of London. One of several cottages originally built to house the local mill's kiln workers, it is now the perfect family home for raising the couple's two boys, Harvey and Ned.

### FIRST IMPRESSIONS

Picture postcard it may be now, but when Julie and David bought the cottage, it was in desperate need of attention. 'The location was perfect; we'd always dreamt of living in a cosy cottage but just didn't expect to find one like this in London,' says Julie. 'The property is Grade II listed but we didn't let that put us off, having tackled a few renovation projects before. It had been rented out for decades as it had been previously owned by a charity so the decor was very bland. Also, most of the original features had been removed over the years so that inside it felt dark and dingy. However, it captured our imagination and we could really see the potential here.'

building costs down. Although the cottage had lost some of its charm over the years and would clearly require a lot of work to restore it, they were able to see past the recent neglect and wanted to recapture the style of the cosy cottage, adding their own contemporary touches along the way. 'David generally likes to know that something has been done properly,' explains Julie, 'so where possible, he prefers to tackle as much of the work himself.'

Structurally the cottage was in good order, but the couple were faced with the tasks of rewiring, putting in new plumbing and replacing the exterior weatherboards. With the hard graft under their belt, they turned their attention to the decor, deciding on a neutral palette with shades of grey and off-white making the cottage lighter. 'We like to mix old with new,' says Julie, 'it's the combination of different styles that can make an interior work.'

#### IN THE MIX

The couple has incorporated a cool contemporary element. 'We love all things vintage and we try to mix different things together and not follow any particular style,' explains Julie. 'We both enjoy nothing more than sourcing items, spending endless hours trawling through antiques fairs and junk shops. I suppose as a stylist I'm always on the lookout for the next big thing.' Their laid-back style has recently inspired the duo to launch an online business featuring several vintage interior pieces as well as a selection of David's bespoke furniture.

With the restoration work behind them, the couple are finally reaping the fruits of their labour. 'We love living in the area and just want to enjoy the cottage,' says Julie. 'We've moved a few times over the past decade, always renovating as we go, so it's time to just let the dust settle.' And the family certainly feel very settled in the little oasis that they have found. 'The area has a lovely village feel, with friendly independent shops and a good family pub,' explains Julie. 'We never worry about the boys going out to play and we can walk to school. I think we'll be more than content to stay put for quite a while.'
